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

Good news and bad news!

On April 20th, Glass Recycling Day, approximately 40 tons of glass were collected from the residents of Gloucester Township- an increase of 28 tons from our first glass collection last October. Three six ton truckloads were picked up from our depot at Glen Ogilvie School alone. We have a lot of "merry-makers" here in the Hamlet! Thank you for contributing. My special thanks goes to those who volunteered their help at the depot, tirelessly sorting glass by colour and removing metal rings, and to the members of the Key Club of Colonel By High School, who had the most strenuous job of loading and unloading all that glass to and from the trucks. Thank-you all! Our second Glass Day was a resounding success! Now, for the BAD NEWS!

NO money was received for our glass! All profits went into Kanata crushers' Township-that's us folks! -- had to pay the cost of nine trucks and one driver per truck for their work. This was unnecessary in view of the amount of glass collected. However, this is hindsight. Foresight suggested that we bring the crusher and bins from Kanata and crush the glass ourselves. Thus, only two trucks and two men would have been required to haul the glass, increasing profits to township considerably. Council objected. Their reasons:

1. They didn't approve of the design of the crusher. The glass dust rising in the operation could be harmful to the operator.

There was no place available in North Gloucester at that time that would be secure from vandals while the crushing was in process.

3. Council felt that the amount of glass collected would not be enough to justify all that effort, as the October collection totalled only 12 tons.

Glass recycling can pay for itself. There will be no extra burden on the taxpayer. One ton of cull(crushed glass) can be sold for \$20.00. A collection of 20 tons is required to pay for each operation. We collected twice that amount in April.

With a permanent depot, you can bring in your glass at your convenience instead of turning your basement into a mini-depot!

The land and money for a glass recycling depot could be available to us in September if we show enough support. Council wants to know how many residents are in favor of a permanent depot in Gloucester Township. Please telephone your reeve, Robert W. MacQuarrie at 824-2412, and let him know that you are in favor of a permanent depot in Gloucester Township.

In the meantime, keep saving your glass for our next collection in October. PLEASE remove any foil and metal rings, expecially on liquor bottles. One metal ring is enough to have a shipment rejected at the glass company. Suggestions would be appreciated from anyone who has any ideas on a better design for a glass crusher or any aspect of the glass crushing operation. NIVEN'S WOODS CONSERVANCY-NEWS RELEASE

A public appeal for funds will be launched in June to try to save a natural and unique pocket of green caught in the path of expanding suburbia in northeast Gloucester township. The pocket of green is Niven's Woods, 22 acres of original cliff, swamp, meadow and forest cover stretching east from Blair Road near the Ottawa River, which is slated for residential development within the year. It is owned by A.B.R. Lawrence, MPP for Carleton.

Recognizing the potential of the woods as an all--season nature classroom for township school children, to say nothing of its quiet charm for older strollers, a committee of concerned citizens called the Niven's Woods Conservancy banded together on April 21 to make a concerted effort to purchase the woods for preservation as a natural park. Prior to this a brief detailing the quality of the woods with its distinctive ecological and geological features was prepared by the conservation committee of Gloucester Pollution Probe and distributed widely. Response to the brief from community associations, schools, Gloucester Council and many private citizens reflected sympathy, dismay and a growing awareness of the need for action.

Niven's Woods is one of those increasing rarities in Canada today, a gem of diverse, natural landscape near a large urban centre. Conservancy president, Dr. EmilioBinavince, and chairman, Mrs. Mary Tollefson, both emphazize that the conservancy's only purpose is to try to keep the woods that way and that it is not a local backlash to development. The conservancy is part of the wider alarm being felt throughout the country over the loss to the public of areas like Niven's Woods.

Niven's Woods Conservancy has the backing of the Nature Conservancy of Canada which has agreed to act as collection centre for and administrator of funds received for the project. The local committee will be seeking financial support on a broad basis but will concentrate its public appeal in Gloucester township. Contributions will be tax-deductible.

TENNIS VIEWS

In the May issue of the BANAR, there was a comment made in the report on the Board's activities on the proposal made by the Tennis Court committee, which in my view does not represent an accurate picture of what has occurred and may suggest that the committee took a rather narrow view of the matter. Such is not the case. As a member of the Board and as an officer of the Association, I felt I should comment on this so that there is no misunderstanding.

It is obvious that the facilities to be placed in Bearbrook Park have to be operated after they are installed, and operated efficiently. We cannot be so naive as to expect divine action in this area but rather we must plan to ensure that the facilities are so operated, which the Gloucester Recreation will require. To this end, the Tennis Committee came up with a proposal.

The proposal was that a tennis committee should be formed which would be a sub-committee of the Sports Committee of the Community Association, and thus would operate under its umbrella. This would be the same as any of our activities. Those interested would pay an annual fee, and this would ensure that the Courts would be maintained, and repaired when that becomes necessary, and it will become necessary. It was originally understood that the users would bear the cost of this maintenance and upkeep. As well this will ensure that there is a tennis program which will enable those children and adults who want advice and training to obtain it. We want players to have an opportunity to develop, so that they can learn the game and enjoy it.

The Community Association has agreed to undertake this particular program, not as a club, but as part of the general scope of activities. Obviously those who pay the annual fee will obtain some preference but I do not see anything unusual, or wrong, in that approach.

In this community, we have been fortunate that we have been able to harness the energies of those who have interests or knowledge in particular areas. The members of the Tennis Committee of the Board deserve credit for their efforts, as do the other committees operating there-under. I hope that they will continue with the same enthusiasm.

To our knowledge we have offended no one, and we feel these same juveniles, if not stopped from further acts of vandalism, will be capable of doing worse things to us and possibly to other households in the community.

I find the following paragraph from the Gloucester Committee on young children to be quite offensive:

The PHDC programme should make it possible for a parent who needs to supplement his or her welfare income to become a Day Care Worker. Thus, rather than only be a user of PHDC, the working mother would be a day care mother to other children while being a real mother to her own. We suggest that she should receive payments for all children under her care and that she should be encouraged, if not forced, to enroll in courses supporting the programme. This suggestion gives her the opportunity to understand her child and learn more about the possibilities for change in-so erosive and so negative-a life style.

Obviously, the proposal involves a choice by the Welfare parent to remain at work rather than to become a Day Care Worker.

This seems to indicate that a working mother isn't a "real" mother to her own unless she's a day care working mother.

Also the expression "if not forced" shouldn't be there at all as it indicates that force could be considered. Welfare need not be "erosive and negative" if used properly.
