Several Blackburn Hamlet swimmers made an important contribution to Gloucester Swim Club's impressive win in the season's first Eastern Ontario development meet at the Nepean Sportsplex on Nov. 3. The most outstanding girl and boy in the division were Lisa Zbitnew and Brian Johnson of the 11 and 12 age group. Lisa came away with 4 first place finishes (400m. free; 200m. free; 200m I.M.; 100m. back) and 2 second place ribbons (100m. free and 200m. back). Brian claimed 2nd place in 5 events (400m. free; 200m. back; 200m. free; 200m. I.M.; 100m. back). Jill Lever and Cameron Barber turned in good performances in the 13 and 14 age group. Cam's efforts included 3 2nd place finishes. In the senior category, Ann Zbitnew did well swimming all five of her events in the "A" division. Other fine efforts in the "A" division were turned in by David Swann (10 and under), and Janet Costar (11 and 12). In the B division, Bobby Johnson (10 and under) had 2 first place finishes. Elizabeth Perkin and Gerald Wiezenbach did not figure in the points standing but improved their times in many events.

All of these performances certainly bolstered the spirit of the team as the Gloucester club dominated the meet overall and firmly established itself as the no. 1 club in Eastern Ontario and the club to beat in the 1974-75 season. Visual Arts Ottawa, an organization of artists and supporters, will stage a major exhibition of art, opening on May 15, 1975 at the Hall of Commerce Building, Lansdowne Park, Ottawa. It will run for 6 weeks and will, for the first time, show the best painting, sculpture, graphics, photography, films and crafts by Ottawa Valley artists in a single exhibition. The purpose of the show is to acquaint the public with the quality and extent of creativity in the Ottawa region.

All creative persons in any field of the visual arts are invited to enter and entry forms will shortly be available at galleries, art schools and art stores. The final selection of work for the exhibition will be made by a panel of consultants, but in order to cover the widest possible area in search of creative talent, the organizers have set up a network of research committees across the region. Besides the display of art, there will be a program of activities, discussions, lectures, films and demonstrations running concurrently with the exhibition during the period of May 15 to June 28, 1975.

Visual Arts Ottawa was formed over a year ago to work for the establishment of a Visual Arts Centre serving the Ottawa area and to provide the region's artists with the opportunity of making a contribution to the life of their community. The Survey Exhibition is made possible by the assistance of the Canada Council, the Arts Council of Ontario, the City of Ottawa and by the voluntary work of artists and other members of the community interested in improving the climate for the visual arts in this region.

In order to achieve an all-inclusive participation of the community, the first week of the exhibition will be designated OTTAWA ARTS WEEK in the hope that all galleries and organizations with exhibition facilities will participate by showing the work of professional, semi-professional and amateur artists as well as student and children's art. Visual Arts Ottawa will act as co-ordinator for these exhibitions.

Organizers of Survey Exhibition No.1 intend to present art in a context that will facilitate involvement by the general public. The main theme of the show will be creativity in the community: the artist as part of society, not apart from it.

INFORMATION GLOUCESTER (741-0770) is the Township's independent community information and referral service, offered free of charge to all Gloucester residents. This non-political organization has been in operation for two years, and during this period has responded to several thousand requests for assistance. The Centre is a totally volunteer operation, open about 30 hours weekly, and utilizes a message recording device to supplement regular service. A 12 member board of directors, representing many areas and community organizations within Gloucester, set policy for a part-time staff of twenty, a volunteer scheduler and a full-time co-ordinator. Owing to the nature and scope of thecentre's activities, there is always a need for additional volunteer staff.

In addition to answering enquiries concerning our community, programs and services, the Centre writes comprehensive information columns for several Gloucester community newspapers, administers various community noticeboards, acts as a distribution point for free government literature as well as that produced by citizen's groups, social agencies, etc., and acts also as a primary resource for Gloucester's own Skyline Cable 3 TV show which is shown every Monday and Wednesday at 6 p.m.

The service administers seventeen community "registries". An example would be someone requiring a local music teacher who would be "matched" with music teachers available. Others would include childcare services, local employment, lists of arts and crafts teachers, pollution probe, educational and recreational opportunities, etc. Due to the large volume of enquiries, people's needs are readily identifiable, and the Centre may assist other community groups by pointing out requirements. The Coordinator continually meets with community and regional representatives from many organizations with a view to channelling and obtaining helpful information which may assist in meeting these needs.

In October, 1974 Information Gloucester took part in a National conference sponsored by the Canadian Council on Urban and Regional Research. Information Gloucester acted as the Canadian representative of community information services of our type, along with representatives of Government services from as far away as Manitoba and British Columbia.

Early in the New Year, Information Gloucester will be moving it's present location in the Earl Armstrong Arena, to new quarters in the community centre, lower level of the district shopping centre now under construction on the corner of Ogilvie and LaVerendrye Drive, Beacon Hill North. The public who shop there will have an additional opportunity to visit the centre, enjoy a friendly cup of coffee in thelounge area, and browse. Provision for young children has been made.

A meeting has been tentatively scheduled for mid-January at which time all those concerned may join together to discuss this proposal, and hopefully, to establish the ommittee.
