Her organization, knowledge and patience are very much appreciated by the authors, reviewers and members of the Scientific Program Committee...particularly its director! Au nom du Comité du programme scientifique, je vous souhaite la bienvenue au Congrès 2012. Je sais que les co-responsables du comité organisateur, Martine Brosseau et Andrew Freeman, ont hâte de vous offrir un environnement bilingue, accueillante, chaleureuse et stimulante où vous pourrez célébrer les occupations et la pratique au fil du temps. Daniel Weinstock holds the Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Political Philosophy in the Department of Philosophy of the Université de Montréal. As of August 2012, he will be Professor of Ethics, Law, and Public Policy at the Faculty of Law of McGill University. He was the Founding Director of the Centre de recherche en éthique de l'Université de Montréal, a position he held between 2002 and 2011. He has served on a number of governmental bodies. Between 2004 and 2008, he was the Chair of the Comité d'éthique de la santé publique du Québec. He is at present a member of the Ethics Advisory Board of the Public Health Authority of Canada. Between 2009 and 2011, he was a member of the Expert Panel on End-of-Life Decision-Making of the Royal Society of Canada

Muriel Driver Memorial Lecturer, Juliette (Archie) Cooper

Friday, June 8th, 15:30 Hilton Quebec, Ballroom

CAOT is proud to honor Dr. Juliette (Archie) Cooper as the 2012 Muriel Driver Lectureship award winner. Dr. Cooper is a Professor Emeritus in the School of Medical Rehabilitation, a Senior Scholar in the Office of the University Secretary, a Professor in the Department of Human Anatomy and Cell Science and the Department of Community Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba.

Dr. Cooper is a preeminent occupational therapy scholar in Manitoba and Canada, with a research program focused on the fields of work disability prevention, biomechanics, and kinematics. Her outstanding accomplishments in these fields of research have contributed greatly to the body of knowledge of occupational therapy over the years and she is recognized as a national occupational therapy leader in work disability prevention for her varied and ongoing contributions. Over the last 25 years, Dr. Cooper has participated in numerous research projects totaling close to \$3 million. Her curriculum vitae includes over 100 publications and more than 100 refereed and invited papers or presentations.

In 2006, in acknowledgment of her outstanding contributions to research and the profession of occupational therapy, Dr. Cooper was nominated by the CAOT for election to the Board of Directors of Research Canada. Her considerable expertise was quickly recognized by Research Canada, and she was subsequently appointed to the Research Canada Strategic Planning Task Force, the Executive Committee, and the Membership Committee, which she now chairs.

At the provincial level, Dr. Cooper served a five-year term on the Manitoba Medical College Foundation. She has worked with the provincial government and agencies on various advisory committees including the Advisory Committee for the Office of Rural and Northern Health, the Manitoba Mental Health Research Committee, and the Research and Knowledge Translation Committee with the Manitoba Lung Association. At the local level, Dr. Cooper served for many years as a Board member and most recently as the Chair of the Allocations Committee of the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation.

Dr. Cooper has devoted her career to giving back to the profession of occupational therapy. She has held many positions in the Manitoba Society of Occupational Therapists (MSOT), making significant contributions to the development of the profession within the province. In 1998, Dr. Cooper received the first MSOT Outstanding Occupational Therapist Award. She also served on the Canadian Journal of Occupational Therapy (CJOT) review board from 1984-92 and as the Scientific Conference co-chair for the 1989 CAOT Conference in Winnipeg. In recognition of her longstanding contributions to occupational therapy scholarship, she was invited to give the inaugural Canadian Occupational Therapy Foundation (COTF) Lunch with a Scholar presentation in 2003.

Mme Cooper est professeure émerite à la School of Medical Rehabilitation, chercheur senior à l'Office of the University Secretary et professeure au Department of Human Anatomy and Cell Science et au Department of Community Health Sciences de l'University of Manitoba.

This investigation indicated that some people choose suicide when faced with an incurable disease and palliative care is not available. The Select Committee on Dying with Dignity hearings and recent surveys in Quebec demonstrated that support for euthanasia is at or near 80% within the province.

Are people choosing assisted suicide or euthanasia because they do not have access to palliative care and are fearful of the impact upon their quality of life?

How can occupational therapy play a role in promoting quality of life at the end of life?

CAOT Professional Issue Forums

Workplace safety and injury prevention in occupational therapy practice in Canada

Thursday, June 7, 8:30-11:30, Beauport

While occupational therapists are considered to be experts in the prevention and treatment of work-related injuries, little attention has been paid to the injuries experienced by occupational therapists themselves. This lack of occupational therapy-specific literature has both educational and practice implications. This professional issue forum seeks to explore and document current trends/issues around workplace safety and injury prevention within occupational therapy practice in Canada. The expected outcome of this presentation and facilitated discussion is to raise awareness, and offer possible solutions to enable a healthy, sustainable workforce. Occupational therapy experts/researchers in workplace safety, educators, employers, members of national workplace safety associations, and injured occupational therapists will be invited to participate in the forum.

Addressing the “Rising Tide of Dementia in Canada”: Occupational therapists supporting people living with dementia

Friday, June 8, 8:30-11:30, Beauport

Rising Tide: The Impact of Dementia on Canadian Society (Alzheimer Society of Canada, 2009), outlines that approximately 500,000 Canadians are currently living with a form of dementia, 70,000 of whom are under the age of 65. By 2038, unless steps are taken to ‘stem this tide’, the number of Canadians with dementia is expected to grow to 1.1 million. Living safely with dementia is an ongoing challenge due to the functional and cognitive changes that dementia brings. To address these challenges, the Canadian Association of Occupational Therapists (CAOT) and the Alzheimer Society of Canada (ASC) have formed a partnership to strengthen the capacity of occupational therapists nationwide and improve the quality of service delivery for people with dementia. This Professional Issue Forum will open a dialogue that is expected to outline the steps that individual occupational therapists and their teams/employers can take to improve service delivery to people with dementia and families and outline the support that CAOT and the ASC can provide to help occupational therapists in their work (e.g. creation of tools, forums, educational materials, advocacy work, etc).

Addressing the « Rising Tide: The Impact of Dementia in Canada » : Occupational therapists supporting people living with dementia

Le document *Raz-de-marée : Impact de la maladie d’Alzheimer et des affections connexes au Canada* (Société Alzheimer Canada, 2009) indique qu'environ 500 000 Canadiens vivent actuellement avec une forme de démence et que 70 000 d'entre eux sont âgés de moins de 65 ans. Strategic leadership: Towards development of a National Activity Guide

The links between occupation, health and well-being are fundamental to the history of occupational therapy and supported by years of research both within and outside the profession. 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

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
